<u>Crystallization-Study – Complete Salvation of God in Romans</u>

General Sketch

- The complete salvation of God in the book of Romans is carried out on and brought into the believers of Christ by the power of God through His complete gospel.
 - Rom. 1:16 For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone who believes, both to Jew first and to Greek.
 - Power of God denotes a powerful force that can break through any obstacle. This power is the resurrected Christ Himself.
 - Rom. 8:10 But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the spirit is life because of righteousness.
 - He is no longer merely the Christ outside the believers, but He is now the Christ within us.
 - The gospel in Romans is the gospel of the One who is now indwelling His believers as their subjective Savior.
- Such a complete salvation of God is composed of God's judicial redemption and His
 organic salvation.
 - Rom 5:10a For if we, being enemies, were reconciled to God through the death of His Son...
 - Forgiveness of sins is based on the redemption of Christ, which was accomplished through His death; it is the initial and basic blessing of God's full salvation.
 - Justification is God's action whereby He approves people according to His standard of righteousness. God can do this on the basis of the redemption of Christ.
 - Propitiation and forgiveness of sins are adequate for a sinner but not for an enemy. An enemy needs reconciliation which goes further than propitiation and forgiveness.
 - Rom 5:10b much more we will be saved in His life, having been reconciled
 - Titus 3:5 Not out of works in righteousness which we did but according
 to His mercy He saved us, through the washing of regeneration and the
 renewing of the Holy Spirit

- The washing of regeneration begins with our being born again and continues with the renewing of the Holy Spirit as the process of God's new creation.
- Sanctification involves not only a change in position; it involves a
 transformation from the natural disposition to a spiritual one by Christ as
 the life-giving Spirit saturating all the inward parts of our being with
 God's nature of holiness.
- To be renewed means that a new element is wrought into our being.
- Transformation is the inward, metabolic process in which God works to spread His divine life and nature throughout every part of our being, particularly our soul, bringing Christ and His riches into our being as our new element and causing our old, natural element to be gradually discharged.
- Conformation is the end result of transformation, where we may match the glorified image of Christ.
- Glorification is the step in God's complete salvation where our body of Sin is completely saturated with the glory of God's life and nature.
- Only by taking the all-inclusive Christ as the center and circumference of the entire book
 of Romans can our exposition be thoroughly adequate.
- God's complete salvation is based upon God's righteousness, which is Christ.
- Christ covers the believers that they may be justified objectively.
- Christ is given to the believers as their righteousness subjectively to become their living so that they may be justified before God subjectively.
- God's righteousness is Christ, and the believers' faith is also Christ, whom they
 appreciate and receive in their hearing of the gospel.
- God's judicial redemption is covered by the first four chapters of the book of Romans, and God's organic salvation is covered by the last twelve chapters.
